From the Principal's Desk

April, 2012

Dear Parents.

April brings spring and it is a great time for us to clean house. In this case we have chosen to clean up the language at King George School. Since my becoming Principal here 4 years ago, we have made many efforts to improve the school climate. Language, while a localized focus with teachers, has not been the major focus overall. Our efforts to improve general behaviour and build a positive environment through efforts like TRIBES have been our main objectives. Now that we are experiencing some notable success in these areas, the inappropriate verbalizations of some of our students now is more noticeable. To that end, we are now systematically targeting inappropriate language. Teachers will still be the primary responders to this when it occurs within their earshot. The change will be that, students who don't choose to modify their language, even after teacher intervention, will be sent to the office. Our response will now usually be a call home where your child will be expected to recount to you exactly the words and phrases they have uttered. If this happens again the same day, another call will be made. and another, and another, until there is no doubt about the attitudes and language of that student. It is our hope that you will work with us to help curb this behaviour so the environment inside and outside the school will be much more pleasant for all. We are sure you do not accept this kind of language at home, so we do ask for your support to curb it here at the school.

Our School Nurse, Joe Kranz, has established a Leadership Group for a number of our students. These students meet weekly and are in the process of developing ideas to help make King George School a better place to learn. We applaud the efforts of Nurse Kranz and thank the students who are showing this leadership.

Our annual Heritage Fair will take place on Monday, April 2 in the gym. Judging will take place in the morning and students from the younger classes will have the opportunity to view the over 50 projects. Our students will be vying for a place in the Regional Heritage Fair in Dunnville, April 25. We will be able to send about 5 projects. This year there is also a Provincial Heritage Fair in Toronto in June. Our Regional participants are eligible to win a place at this event.

Education week is coming up, May 7 – 11. It promises to be an exciting time for all. On Tuesday, May 8, our Book Fair begins. Students will be able to view the many books for sale and purchase these over the following week and a half. On Wednesday May 9, our annual major fund raiser, the DPA-a-Thon will engage all our students for the day. It is a great

opportunity for students to participate in life activities that they may not have access to otherwise. In addition, the funds raised will directly support our students through the daily morning meal program and through access to further technology in the classroom. Please do take the effort seriously and encourage your child to ask family and friends to pledge their support. On Thursday, May 10, parents are asked to come to the school for two major events. Starting at 4:00 our second annual Literacy Night will be held. This will provide you with a range of ideas and skills to help you help your children with their developing literacy. At the same time the Book Fair will be open to all so you can assist your children with their reading choices. Later in the evening our annual Intermediate Air Band competition/performance will take place (7:00 in the gym). Parents are welcome to come see their children perform. It was a wonderful event last year and this year looks to be even better.

Children and Self-Esteem

Self-esteem is the value we place on ourselves. It's the way we feel about ourselves and the way that we see ourselves.

Children with healthy self-esteem are happier, have more friends and are more likely to be accepted by others. They have fewer illnesses and are better able to cope with stress. As a parent, you have the greatest influence when it comes to shaping your child's self-esteem. Developing a healthy self-esteem in childhood can lead to healthy and productive adult lives.

Tips to Help Your Child Build a Healthy Self-Esteem:

- Show your child that they are loved simply because they exist
- Avoid comparing your child to other siblings or children
- Show respect for your child by asking them for their input, opinions, and suggestions
- Focus on your child's strengths and assets rather than constantly pointing out their weaknesses and problems.

🏹 Parents' awareness can block bullying

Bullying is a serious problem that deserves your attention—even if your child is not bullied or a bully. To prevent bullying:

- Recognize bullying. Bullying comes in many forms. It can be physical, verbal or written, such as in emails or text messages. It can also be silent, when a child is left out on purpose.
- Supervise your child's activities. Bullying often occurs when adults aren't around. You may be able to prevent bullying just by being nearby.
- React to bullying. If your child knows someone who is being bullied, she should inform you or another responsible adult about the situation. If you suspect that your child is being bullied—or bullying others—seek help quickly before the problem gets worse.

Find chances to boost responsibility

Adolescents don't morph into responsible young adults overnight. It's a process, and it takes time. To nurture your child's sense of responsibility:

- Enforce consequences if your child breaks the rules. This will remind her that she is responsible for her actions.
- Have her manage money. Nothing hammers home the responsibility message like empty pockets! Give your child opportunities to earn money and teach her how to manage those earnings.
- Assign chores. Chores are ideal for building responsibility, and completing them will make your child feel capable.
- Let her make choices. Whenever it's reasonable—and

safe—for her to make her own decisions, stand back and let her.

Safe Schools

Our Safe Schools Committee is revisiting the section our school improvement plan that addresses promoting a safe school environment. The Grand Erie District School Board has developed electronic School Climate surveys to help schools gather data in this area. The surveys combine elements of the original Ministry bullying survey, student perceptions survey, and are aligned with Character Education, Equity and Inclusive Education, Growing Success and now secondary program effectiveness. They measure various aspects of the teaching and learning environment identified in academic research as important influences on learning.

Our students in grades 3-8 will be completing surveys online at school April 19-26, 2012.



The students will complete one of two surveys designed for elementary students, one for grades 3-5 and grades 6-8.

We are also looking for input from parents and guardians. To access the survey go to on the Board's website www.granderie.ca and click on the "board survey" tab. Use the following passwords: **School Climate Survey for Parents: pr5XAp.** You will be asked to indentify the school.

At the end of April, we will ask the Board Researcher to gather the data and forward it to our Safe Schools Committee. The

committee will meet in May to discuss the findings and will report back to the school staff and the School Council in June.

On March 8, 2012, our grades 5—8 students participated in a presentation put on by a Child and Youth Worker from Safe Schools. Her presentation highlighted the need to be a responsible digital citizen and raised awareness of online dangers.
