From the Principal's Desk

May 2012

Dear Parents.

We are now entering into the second last month of the school year. Where has the time gone? As usual, we have a very busy schedule for the coming month. Do make sure to check the calendar to keep up on everything.

There are a few items that need to be mentioned. One has to do with our efforts to keep the playground clean and safe for your children. I am sure there are times where you have noticed garbage on the yard. We do schedule classes to be in charge of cleanup throughout the year. It has a greater importance at this time of the year as the use of the playground during the day and the evening is much increased. We take reasonable precautions to ensure the safety of your child when they are picking up garbage. They are instructed to **NOT** pick up glass or needles. While this is not regularly present on the playground, there are times when this is evident. Our Custodian routinely checks the outside each morning and especially after weekends to collect those items that could be dangerous. Students doing cleanup are also improving their own living environment. It is a good lesson on responsibility.

Do note that children like the playground. As a result some try to get to school early to play. Parents need to know that the school begins formal supervision of the playground at 8:40 AM. As a result, we ask that your child come to school at that time. We have heard from some concerned community members regarding unsupervised children early in the morning. One requirement that all schools have regarding safety is to hold four fire drills and two lockdown drills, split before and after Christmas every year. We did complete our drills before Christmas and are now planning to do so to finish the year. The two fire drills will likely happen on good weather days between now and the end of the year. The lockdown drill is specifically scheduled for some time on the 14th of May. We don't specify the time, but by giving you all

the date, we are hoping that nobody panics when their child comes home talking about a lockdown. A real lockdown is a serious event and we need to be well prepared to make it work. Our hope is that there will never be a life threatening situation that warrants a real lockdown.

Exploring the World through the Arts

Attitude: Have a positive attitude towards the arts and try not to have unrealistic expectations of your child's abilities.

Praise: Focus on the creative process and not on what the end product looks like. Praise your child for working hard and not giving up when faced with a challenge.
